What's in this guide

This booklet tells you how to get equipment that helps you with everyday living at home.

You may be surprised at the range of equipment available. The equipment you need might be large like a stairlift, or a perching stool, or a small device such as a manual or battery-operated jar opener.

Finding out what there is and choosing what might suit you can be tricky. This guide will help. It will be useful whether you are buying privately or getting help through social care or health services.

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How to decide what equipment you need

An assessment for equipment can be as simple as deciding for yourself, for example, you need a device to help you open jars and cans or help you comb your hair.

If you are unable to manage other everyday activities such as preparing food, bathing, dressing, or going upstairs, you will probably benefit from a more structured assessment of your equipment needs.

There are several different ways to get an assessment:

- You may prefer to be assessed independently without involving the NHS or Social Services. More details about these kinds of assessments are given on page 5. If you decide to buy your own equipment, this leaflet provides information on how to research your choices and seek further advice.
- Alternatively, you may contact **Social Care Services** and receive guidance on receiving an assessment by an Occupational Therapist or a Vision and Hearing Rehabilitation & Technical Officer. Further information on page 5.
- If you are in Hospital or receiving Community Health Service, a doctor may refer you to an Occupational Therapist, Physiotherapist or Nurse for an assessment for the types of equipment listed on page 9 and 10.

How to get an independent assessment of your equipment needs

Free Simple Assessments

A Simple assessment is available from an Approved Retailer in a local shop. Approved retailers are local retailers who have demonstrated a commitment to work in partnership with Sutton Council. They all have accessible premises, and can be recognised with the tick symbol.

A **free Simple Online Assessment** for equipment is available at www.AskSara.org.uk.

This online assessment asks you simple questions about how you manage everyday activities. When you have answered all the questions it will offer suggestions of equipment which might be helpful to you.

If you don't have a computer at home you can use one at a library or at the Sutton Centre for Independent Living & Learning (SCILL). Contact details for SCILL on page 11 of this guide.

Assessment by Social Care Services

You may wish to contact Social Services to discuss your daily living routines with trained People's Contact Centre staff. They will be able to give you advice, information and signpost you to disability resources in the community.

If you are having difficulty in the majority of areas of your life because of disability, our Contact Centre staff can arrange for an Occupational Therapy Assessment.

If you have a sensory impairment the Contact Centre can arrange for a Vision and Hearing Assessment.

If you are a parent/guardian of a child or a young person with a disability, you may also contact the **Access Point 020 8770 4690** for advice.

You may also refer yourself to the Occupational Therapy service via the online **Occupational Therapy Assessment Contact and Referral form**. This is found under the **Apply For It** section of the Sutton council website www.sutton.gov.uk.

You may be offered an appointment at London Borough of Sutton's Occupational Therapy Assessment Centre.

The professional who assesses you can advise on specialist techniques, equipment and adaptations.

You will also be advised if you are eligible for social care support. The eligibility framework looks at each person's needs and risks. You may be signposted to disability resources.

Any fully state-funded equipment you receive as a result of a Social Services or NHS assessment will be on loan to you, and you will be requested to return it when you no longer need it.

Making the most of your assessment

Before you have any kind of assessment, it will help if you think about the following questions:

- What basic types of movement, eg walking, standing up, balancing, do you find difficult?
- Is seeing or hearing easy or difficult?
- Think about your house and how easy it is to manage.
 Do you have stairs or steps? Do you find it easy or difficult to go up or down them?
- What everyday tasks are easy or difficult? Eg:
 - · Washing
 - · Getting in or out of a bath
 - · Getting on and off a toilet

Tips before buying equipment

- Talk to other equipment users. Local organisations and local branches of national organisations are listed on pages 11–12 of this guide.
- Look up expert advice on the internet. See page 13 for contact details for some useful national organisations.
- Talk to your local approved trusted assessors. There is a list of approved local retailers of equipment on pages 14–17 of this leaflet.
- Obtain national retailers' catalogues (page 18).
- Talk to your social and health care staff.

Think about:

- How you wish to use the equipment.
- Will it be what you want in 6 months?
- How will you store the equipment?
- How will you maintain and service the equipment?
- Comparing prices and searching for the best value.
- If you are registered disabled you may complete a VAT exemption form when purchasing equipment.
- Page 19 gives information about buying secondhand.

Advice on your legal rights


Whenever you buy goods from a trader the law provides valuable protection to all consumers whether or not they are disabled. These rights are often referred to as your 'statutory rights' because they come mainly from the Sale of Goods Act. Useful sources of legal information include:
