#### Welcome to our autumn term newsletter

We have worked hard to provide new resources and are pleased that we have been able to add a ball pool and soft play to our sensory area. We have also been lucky to purchase a new bouncy castle which is lower and smaller, both in length and width.

It's always nice to bring you the positive news but occasionally we have to share the negatives; the youth club is about to enter a period of uncertainly, mainly due to the decision made by the local authority to change the way they support organisations like ours with funding.

Achieving for Children and the Royal Borough of Kingston are currently consulting service users and the wider community on how they should provide services to young people in the future. Part of this consultation includes the proposed closure of youth centres including the Devon Way Centre. Please visit Kingston.gov.uk for more information and to take part in the consultation.

Rest assured the leadership team are working hard to secure the facilities and funds required to continue our great adventure.

Back to the good news! The staff team received a certificate of recognition for providing Accessible, Diverse and Exciting Activities to Disabled Young People. A massive thankyou to those who brought along the food to share.






#### **Dragons Den**

The beginning of October was mild, providing us with the opportunity to hold our Winter Games outside. Winners were awarded TAG medals and all participates received a certificate and cake!








### Star For The Night

#### **Trick or Treat**


Another night of spooky going on's including a disco and fancy dress competition.

The evening started with a visual fireworks display projected onto the wall in the main hall while the youth workers lit the BBQ and prepped the food.


The flames were high and bright, which gave us the opportunity to toast some marshmallows.

Finishing the evening we made chocolate bonfires.






#### **Best of British**

### Hampton Court Palace Ice Skating Night


With continued success in our family activities offer it was only suitable that we included a wintery activity.


We have not attended Hampton Court Place's ice rink for a number of years and this gave us the opportunity to re-establish this event in our calendar.

### OUR NEW RESOURCES

With lots of hard work and generosity from members, their family and friends, grants, the local community and businesses we have been in the position to purchase some new and exciting resources to enhance our offer.

We have been able to purchase phase one of our portable stage and are approximately a grand away from purchasing phase two, which includes an extra three panels, providing an extra 1X3 metre performing space and a portable ramp, making the stage fully accessible.

We have been fortunate to be in a position to buy extra equipment for our new sensory room including lighting, a ball pool and soft play shapes.

We have also been able to purchase some larger soft play and an indoor bouncy castle for use in the main hall.

We have invested in our general offer and have added musical instruments and increased our range of board games, jigsaws and fine motor skill activities.






### Community Day
